



COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHT: Clifton L. Atkinson

In the den at his house, Clifton Atkinson has a number of plaques that he has accumulated throughout his lifetime prominently displayed in the room. But the awards that make him especially proud are the ones that acknowledge his volunteer work and service for the Town of Forest Heights.

There's the Community Service Volunteer Award that Mr. Atkinson received from Mayor Sue McGinnis in 2001; the Forest Heights Founders' Day and Cultural Festival Award from Mayor Paula Noble in 2004; the Gorgeous Prince George's Day Volunteer Award from the Citizens Concerned for a Cleaner County and the Gorgeous Prince George's Committee in 2003, and many others.

"That right there means a lot to me," he said. "That's just like giving me \$10,000. You can show people what you have done with these awards."

Mr. Atkinson has devoted his time and service to the Town of Forest Heights under eight mayoral administrations, starting with Mayor Warren F. Adams. During Mayor Noble's term, he was elected to serve two terms on the Town Council representing Ward II.

As a volunteer, Mr. Atkinson has plowed snow for the town during the winters. He has participated in cleanups of Oxon Run, picked up litter from the school bus stop at the intersection of Seneca and Mohican drives, and planted and watered trees throughout the town. He has also repaired and replaced parts for the town's police vehicles. For Forest Heights Day, Mr. Atkinson uses his own vehicle and gas to haul all the food, and cooks all the hot dogs and hamburgers on his own barbecue grill, never once asking the town for reimbursement fees.

Two years ago, when the area was hit by a tornado and debris was blocking his neighborhood, he used his own truck and chainsaw to clear the wreckage and create a pathway for residents to get out.

"I'm always available in this town if they need me," he said. "If the mayor called me today and said 'Clift, I need you to do something for me' and if I had something else to do that day, I would always slide whatever I was doing to the side."

In addition to his civic work, Mr. Atkinson worked as a truck driver for 42 years, and was a member of the Teamsters Local Union 639 for 38 years. He worked 26 years for Preston Trucking Co. – The 151 Line, which was based in Landover at the time. During his time at Preston, he was honored with the prestigious Million Mile Club Award, which recognizes drivers who have traveled over a million miles without an accident, and the company's Superior Performance Award.

FOREST HEIGHTS POLICE DEPARTMENT



I would like to remind our citizens that in the event of an emergency they are to call the Prince George's County 911 Call Center. The 911 operator will dispatch the on duty Forest Heights Officer or when necessary a District 4 Prince George's County Police Officer. For clarification the FHPD office is not a call dispatch center. There are several reasons and advantages for this system. Calling the 911 center in an emergency allows the caller to be recorded thus accurately capturing information that may be needed for future reference. It also affords crucial information on suspects, descriptions, vehicles, activities and destinations of travel to be broadcasted to not just FHPD Officers, but the County Officers as well. Timely reporting and notification to the police is essential in locating suspects and responding to emergencies. The dispatchers are trained to ask callers appropriate questions before providing the information to the responding officers. The 911 operator will assign the appropriate number of officers to respond to the call. If anyone has any questions regarding this or any related matters, please feel free to contact the FHPD with their questions. Citizens may still directly contact FHPD if there are matters you want brought to our attention, that do not require an immediate response.

Finally, again let me commend those citizens who want to take back this community by calling the police when they noticed the suspicious activities of several individuals in a vehicle who were engaged in drug activity. Thanks to these citizens, two subjects were captured with a quantity of Controlled Dangerous Substances enough to be charged with possession with the intent to distribute by your FHPD, assisted by the Prince George's County Police.

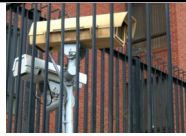

Police Chief Stewart Russell met with a group of Forest Heights residents on Jan. 17 to discuss plans to add new surveillance cameras to the town. The Chief has established a Surveillance Camera/Public Safety Committee, which is comprised of several town residents. The committee has been assigned the task of looking at various types of camera systems and equipment, as well as the locations and placement of the cameras. The town may also have to purchase poles in order to mount the cameras. The Chief and Committee members are working closely with the Mayor and Town Manager to bring this program to fruition. IMPORTANT changes from the Maryland MVA - Please Read!

Maryland Drivers can now ADD THREE EMERGENCY CONTACTS TO THEIR DRIVER'S LICENSE so police will know who to call if an accident occurs. The emergency contact information is stored electronically on an individual's driver's license and will be available only to authorized law enforcement personnel.

You can go to the MVA's website at www.mva.maryland.gov and add your three emergency contacts in just a few minutes. You will need your Driver's License Number to complete this process.

1. Go to the website: www.mva.maryland.gov
2. Go to "On-line Transactions" (upper left) & click on "More".
3. Click on "Emergency Contacts" (bottom of left column)
4. Follow prompts.

Another note... Beginning January 1st, 2013, the MVA will no longer be sending out Driver's License renewal notices. It's your responsibility to keep track of when it's due for renewal. And be careful, if you miss your renewal date for over a year, you will have to take a driver's test again! Driving without a "valid" Driver's License is considered a MAJOR VIOLATION & could affect your insurance premium.

Community Update from the Mayor's Office

Oxon Hill High Realignment

More than 200 people attended a School Boundary Meeting Jan. 16 at Oxon Hill High School hosted by District 8 Board of Education Member Edward Burroughs III. The purpose of the meeting was to review options and a transition plan affecting current Oxon Hill High students and Oxon Hill Middle School students who will be entering high school for the 2013-14 year. A new facility is being constructed for Oxon Hill High, which is scheduled to open in August. Current enrollment at the school exceeds 1,600 students, but the Maryland Public School Construction Program approved funding to construct a building with a capacity for only 1,200 students due to the availability of open seats in adjacent schools. A few options have been proposed to alleviate the overcrowding at Oxon Hill High, which include:

- Option 1:** Reassigning the portion of the attendance area north of the beltway to Potomac High School
- Option 1A:** incoming 9th graders only would be moved to Potomac High
- Option 1B:** incoming 9th and rising 10th graders would be moved to Potomac High
- Option 1C:** incoming 9th and rising 10th & 11th graders would be moved to Potomac High
- Option 2:** Develop a comprehensive boundary realignment plan involving Crossland High, Friendly High and Potomac High

Burroughs said the Board of Education has recommended Option 1B, but will not make a final decision until Feb. 21. Burroughs also stated at the meeting that there would be "no such recommendation to strip Oxon Hill High of its Science and Technology Program" despite initial rumors that the program was being moved to Potomac High. Under Option 1B, children in the Town of Forest Heights would be attending Potomac High.

The Board held a Boundary Public Hearing on Jan. 30, and will hold another one on Feb. 6 at 7 p.m. at the Sasscer Administration Building, located at 14201 School Lane in Upper Marlboro. The public is encouraged to participate and share their input. To register to speak for three minutes, call 301-952-6300 by 4:30 p.m. the date of the hearing. Plan Prince George's 2035

Tiffany Williams Jennings from the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission gave a presentation at the Jan. 20 Monthly Council Meeting on an anticipated General Plan for Prince George's County. Plan Prince George's 2035 will establish broad policies and strategies on important land use, economic development, transportation, infrastructure, environmental and other quality of life priorities. The General Plan does not change land use designations or zoning on individual properties; it serves as a blueprint to help the community achieve its long-term vision by guiding future growth, development and public investments. One example that Jennings pointed out was how Prince George's County has a number of "food deserts" — areas that lack access to affordable fruits, vegetables, whole grains, low-fat milk and other foods that make up the full range of a healthy diet — which the plan will hopefully be able to address.

Plan Prince George's 2035 is an update of the 2002 *Prince George's County Approved General Plan*, and when approved, will replace the 2002 plan. Park and Planning officials are currently gathering feedback from communities, and intend to release a preliminary draft in Summer 2013. They anticipate a joint public hearing in Fall 2013 and Plan Approval/Planning Board Adoption in Winter 2013. O'Malley Pushes for Gun Control Legislation

In mid-January, Gov. Martin O'Malley (D) announced his plans to curb gun violence in Maryland following the December school shooting in Newtown, CT, that left 20 children and six adults dead. According to media outlets, the proposals include banning high-capacity, military assault weapons; reducing the capacity of magazine clips from 20 rounds to 10; requiring a license for every handgun purchase, with mandatory fingerprinting, background and safety training checks; and restricting access to guns for state residents who have mental disorders and a history of violence.

According to the Prince George's Gazette, O'Malley also proposed measures to increase school safety in Maryland, including \$25 million in school construction money to pay for improvements to schools such as shatterproof glass, buzzer systems on doors, and cameras at entrances. He also called for the creation of a Maryland Center For School Safety to collect data and distribute information on best practices and reviews of emergency plans for K-12 schools and higher-education facilities. Our District 26 Delegate Jay Walker, who has worked diligently over the past two years with members of the Maryland General Assembly to draft legislation on the safety of children, has indicated that he is making the Maryland Center For School Safety his top legislative priority for 2013. Walker was appointed a member of the Task Force to Study the Creation of a Maryland Center For School Safety.

Economic Development Forum on Eastover-Glassmanor-Forest Heights Sector Plan

The Town of Forest Heights and the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission hosted an Economic Development Forum on a proposed sector plan for the Glassmanor-Eastover-Forest Heights area Jan. 4 at the town administration building. Approximately 50 people attended the event, which included local business owners, religious leaders and community members. During the forum, participants had the chance to discuss their ideas and visions for the new sector plan. Consultants have outlined the project into four Redevelopment Focus Areas:

- MD 210 Gateway sites**
 - North** - Eastover, thrift store site, bridge at DC/MD border
 - South** - South facing view of 210 from Livingston Road
- MD 210 commercial corridor**
 - Glassmanor**
 - Town of Forest Heights**

The Town of Forest Heights Introduces New Town Planner

The Town of Forest Heights recently hired Linwood Robinson as its new Town Planner to work with the Town to create the Sustainability Plan.

Robinson is originally from the Washington, D.C.-metropolitan area, grew up in Prince Georges County and attended the former Canterbury School in Accokeek.

Robinson graduated from Morehouse College in Atlanta earning a degree in statistical analysis and psychology. Following college, Robinson began his career as a statistical analyst for the City planning department of Atlanta, where he developed an interest in urban planning. As a result, he was soon promoted to a city planner position.

Robinson has 25 plus years of expertise in various fields of urban planning, including transportation, urban design, zoning, land use and public safety. His most memorable professional experience occurred during the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta, where he developed and managed a public property street vending program for the City. The program was a big success and resulted in over \$3 million of revenue for Atlanta.

Before coming to Forest Heights, Robinson served as the Director of Planning for the City of Fayetteville, Ga., where he oversaw all functions of city planning for that municipality.

Currently, Robinson also serves as Executive Director for the Maryland Chapter of the National Conference of Black Mayors, a nonprofit mayoral support organization that provides technical assistance and other resources that help mayors throughout the state better serve their constitu-

The purpose of the Plan is to set priorities and finalize a plan for Forest Heights that will guide development and identify neighborhoods and areas in the community in need of revitalization and investment. The plan would also include implementation strategies for related recommendations.



The plan will address such concerns as infrastructure needs, affordable housing economic development cultural historic resource protection and public safety.

After adoption of sustainability plan and receiving sustainable community designation local governments and other stakeholders will have the opportunity to apply to various funding programs that we financially assist with revitalization these neighborhoods in a sustainable manner.

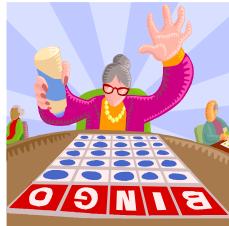

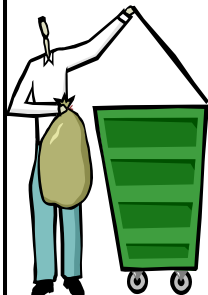

Forest Heights Trash Service Review January 18, 2013



New Bins: we have now confirmed that every address in Forest Heights has received their new bin per our contract with the Goode Company, Inc. Any request for bins in the future will require residents or home owners to purchase the bin. New bins are **\$60.00 plus \$15.00** delivery charge. Used bins are available as long as they last and the total cost will be **\$35.00**. If you are a renter and depending on your rental contract, you or the home owner will be responsible for providing the bin. Replacement bins or a second bin can be purchase by **calling 301-486-7501** as noted above used bins are \$35.00 as long as they are available. We recommend you record the number on the bin and also paint your address on the bin.

Unacceptable Trash Bins: Forest Heights has the lowest trash service rate in the county because the mayor and council approved an extended contract as well as the automated service which requires only one employee, while the county service requires 3 employees for each trash truck. The automated service requires the special bin. **Trash will not be picked up if the special bin is not used. Note: The trash lid must be at least 45% closed/or your trash will not be picked up. Trash stacked on the top of the bin will not be picked up.**

Reduce, Reuse & Recycle: increased recycling may reduce the need for a second bin as it goes in the recycle bin instead of the trash bin. Also, some items can be **reused i.e. juice bottles, cans, etc., In the shop.** Recycle products include glass, plastic, paper, empty cans, egg cartons, junk mail, magazines, phone books, flattened boxes, milk cartons, jars, light bulbs, metal caps and lids, foil, all plastic bottles, clam shells, plastic cups, and cardboard.

Recycling Bins: the recycle program is through the county and bins for service can be secured by calling the **county recycling number 301-883-5045**.

Trash Service Harassment: Trash service employee harassment will not be condoned as they are providing the service requested by the Mayor and Council.

Bulk Trash Items: each residence is allowed three bulk items (non-metal) per week, which may be placed in an old trash container or set on the curb. (furniture, matters, clothes,)

Town Pick Up Service: the town will pick up old stoves, refrigerators, freezers, tires, water heaters, washers, dryers, and electronic equipment. The fee is \$35.00 for each item. Tires are \$4.00 or \$6.00 if on a rim.

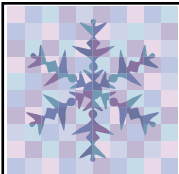
Tree Law



In Maryland, a property owner may utilize "self-help" to trim back at the property line any tree branches or roots encroaching from an adjoining property. This includes trimming overhanging branches located above the ground that break the imaginary plane located along the property line. The exception is that any trimming of encroaching branches or roots must not be so severe as to threaten the health of the adjoining property owner's tree or other vegetation. If a tree straddles the property line, it is considered jointly owned by both neighbors and both must agree to any removal or pruning of the boundary line tree, unless the tree immediately presents an unsafe condition.

Another exception to the self-help remedy exists with regard to roadside trees. Any person who desires to cut down or trim any roadside tree must apply to either the Maryland Department of Natural Resources or the local government (county or municipality) for a permit. Nonetheless, permits are not required to trim a tree that is uprooted or has branches broken so as to endanger persons or property unless local ordinances state otherwise. Roadside trees are typically located within the unimproved portion of the public right of way; however, one should check with the Town and/or a recorded plat to determine the exact location of the property lines.

When dealing with dead trees, the owner on whose property the dead tree stands may have a duty to prevent injury to neighbors or passersby where the tree poses a danger. The owner of an urban tree, such as in Forest Heights, typically has a higher legal duty to use reasonable care to protect the safety of others. If an urban property owner had notice or was otherwise made aware of a dangerous tree condition, he or she would be held responsible for any damages or injuries to unsuspecting persons or property caused by fallen dead branches. If the fallen tree or branch results without prior notice or occurs to a healthy tree, it is often referred to as an "Act of God" and the owner is typically not considered to be liable.



(Jan. 24th & 25th) Snow! Town snow removal services had most streets clear by 2 pm the 24th, during our first storm in spite of the fact that long lines were encountered at the salt barn on the 24th and salt barrels have been set up by the Public Works employees.

The Town Administrator continues to monitor work on FH Streets by WSSC as they continue to finalize repairs of street cuts and the final patch work as weather permits. Final patches are needed at 139 South Huron, 5508 Arapahoe Dr., 5916 Choc-taw Dr., 1005 Comanche Dr., 603 Quade St., 5805 Sachem Dr., 5807 Sachem Dr., 5502 Woodland Dr., 5602, 5603, and 5604 Shawnee Dr. According to WSSC, the final street repair is projected to be completed up to 45 days after the initial street cut repair.

WSSC Citizen Advisory Board (CAB) has expressed a number of concerns such as water waste, communicating with communities when a street must be cut, sewer over flows into area surface water. In addition, the CAB refused to endorse a 7% rate increase for the coming year.

Public Works is working on price quotes to repair the brick wall at the circle. They are also addressing the water problem on Arapahoe Dr. at the fire hydrant, and the sink hole on Sachem Dr.

The 2 Rs of Natural Gas Safety If you think you have a natural gas emergency, go to a safe location. Then call Consumers Energy toll-free at **1-800-477-5050**. It is important that you call -- **DO NOT E-MAIL** -- and report the emergency. Feel free to print this page and leave it with your emergency numbers in case you have a gas emergency.

Knowing how to recognize, react to and report natural gas emergencies can eliminate or minimize their consequences.

Recognize

Signs of a natural gas leak include:

- A "rotten egg" odor
- A blowing or hissing sound
- Dead or discolored vegetation in an otherwise green area
- Flames, if a leak has ignited
- Dirt or dust blowing from a hole in the ground
- Bubbling in wet or flooded areas

React

If you suspect a natural gas leak, follow these steps:

- Leave the area immediately and call us at **1-800-477-5050**, then follow our instructions
- Do not use any electrical device, such as light switches, telephones or appliances such as garage door openers. They could spark and ignite the gas.
- Do not use an open flame, matches or lighters
- Do not try to locate the source of the gas leak
- Do not try to shut off any gas valves or appliances
- Do not start vehicles
- Do not re-enter the building or return to the area until a Consumers Energy employee says it's safe to do so
- If the natural gas ignites, let it burn. Do not put out the flame; burning gas will not explode.

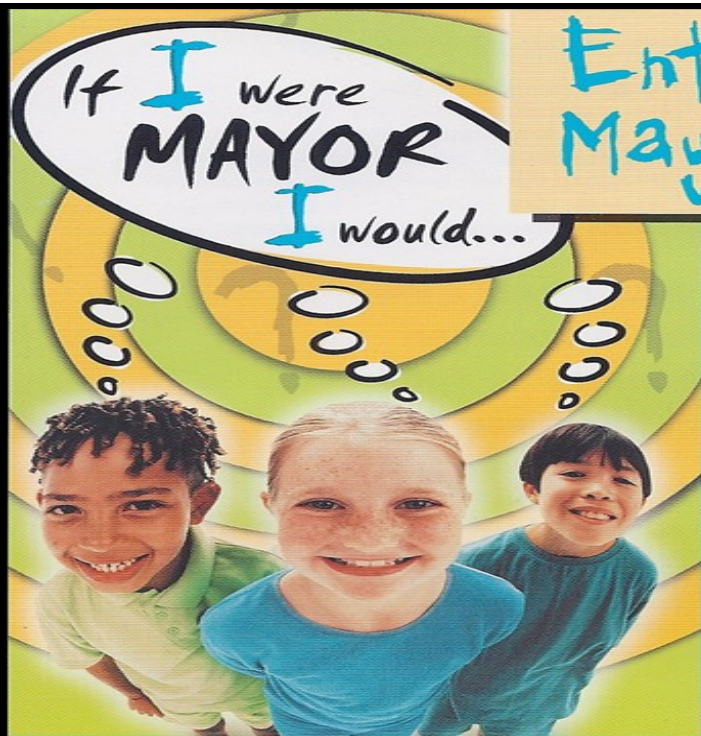

Black History Month 2013 Celebrates Crossroads of Freedom, During this February, the African American community and the nation as a whole will be celebrating Black History Month using the 85th theme of: **“At the Crossroads of Freedom and Equality: The Emancipation Proclamation and the March on Washington.”**

The annual theme is conceived by the Association for the Study of African American Life and History in Washington, D.C., an organization created by the noted and late Black Historian Carter G. Woodson, who authored the book “The Soul of Black Folk.”

After the 1963 March where Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., delivered his now famous “I Have A Dream Speech”, the passages of the Civil Rights Act and the Voting Rights Act in 1964 and 1965, respectively were additional links in the historic chain of events that Blacks and their allies achieved to secure the gains they realize today, including the election of the nation’s first Black President of the United States.

Historians refer to the Emancipation Proclamation as a “wartime measure” issued by President Abraham Lincoln. It freed relatively few slaves, most of who lived in the southern tier of states But it fueled the fire of the enslaved to strike for their freedom. In many respects, Lincoln’s declaration simply acknowledged the epidemic of Black self-emancipation – spread by Black freedom crusaders like Harriet Tubman – that already had commenced beyond his control.

Is “try” the “most dangerous word to use at work?” What other words signal failure at the office?

Try is the most dangerous word to use at work, Brad Hoover, CEO of the Internet company Grammarly, writes at Fortune magazine.

“When I hear employees say they will “try to meet a deadline,” “try to close a deal,” or “try to handle a customer issue,” my next question is what we need to do to ensure their success. “Hoover wrote. “When asked to complete a task that you do not feel is realistic, it’s better to suggest a more feasible goal. Managers appreciate problem solvers and employees who come to the table with solutions rather than problems.”

Other words that could put a worker in danger, Hoover writes, are *someday, if, never, maybe, used to and can’t.*
