



COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHT: Aaron D. Spears

In November 1994, Aaron D. Spears left his hometown of Forest Heights to pursue an acting career in California. He had only two suitcases of clothes and \$77 in his pocket.

"I had no training, but here I was about to jump on a plane with a one-way ticket to be an actor," he recalled.

The transition to his new life on the West Coast proved to be challenging. The job that he had lined up in California fell through, and after two weeks, his friend and roommate had decided to leave. He went homeless for a night. He worked several odd jobs. Yet Mr. Spears did not give up. Through his hard work, dedication and tenacity — and with support from his loved ones — Mr. Spears has now managed to make a name for himself in Hollywood with an impressive film and television career.

"Forest Heights was a major inspiration for everything I've done and accomplished," he said. "I'm still friends with the people I met in kindergarten. I learned how to conduct myself as a young man because of the people in the neighborhood; they schooled us on what not to do and what to do. I had great mentors and teachers."

He and his wife have been married for 13 years and have five children. His parents still live in the family home on Arapahoe Terrace.

"Whenever I come home, I always bring the family. My kids experienced their first snow in Forest Heights. I still feel safe in Forest Heights," he said. "[Living in Forest Heights] was a great way to grow up. I felt protected but free at that same time."

Mr. Spears has appeared in a number of television shows such as "NCIS," "CSI Miami," "Bones," "Castle," "Criminal Minds," "Shark," "Boston Legal" and more. Since 2009, he has been performing on the soap opera "The Bold and the Beautiful" where he plays Justin Barber, the Executive Vice President of Mergers and Acquisitions for Spencer Publications. He also appeared in the 2006 film "Babel" and co-produced and starred in the 2007 film "The Mannsfield 12."

Mr. Spears graduated from Flintstone Elementary School, Oxon Hill Middle School and Oxon Hill High School. He played football for Oxon Hill High, and ran track and played basketball for the Oxon Hill Boys & Girls Club.

Initially, Mr. Spears had intended on pursuing a career in professional football. While playing football at Clarion University, he was named "Rookie of the Year" and made the front page of the school newspaper. After his sophomore year, he transferred to Delaware State University for its well-known football program, where he started getting the attention of scouts. During the second semester of his senior year, Mr. Spears suffered a stress fracture on his leg while running track in Atlanta. Around the same time, the NFL draft was taking place, and he learned that he had been picked by the New York Jets.

Mr. Spears spent some time rehabilitating himself, but the injury left him questioning whether he really wanted to pursue a career that would take such an immense physical toll on his body. At school, he missed a speech assignment in his speech class. His teacher said he would only be able to make up the assignment if he participated in a play production.

"I wanted that A in that class so I did the play, and got kind of struck by the whole ordeal of acting, being exposed to it," he said. "I realized that I loved football still, but found something else that I was passionate about just as much that wasn't going to deteriorate my body."

Mr. Spears recalled a lot of fond memories from his childhood in Forest Heights: riding on his bike to explore both sides of the Town; watching the 4th of July fireworks show in D.C. from his house; playing sports games with the neighborhood kids; riding his sled downhill on his street during the winters.

This is the newest high school facility to be built in southern Prince George's County in 44 years. The last new school facility was Friendly High School, according to Congresswoman Donna Edwards. The ceremony also included performances from the prestigious Oxon Hill High School Choir and the Oxon Hill High School "Clipper" Marching Band.

The new building features: an 800-seat auditorium, a Health and Wellness Center, 49 classrooms, 2 ESOL classrooms, 14 special education classrooms, a media center and multipurpose room.

The Weatherization Assistance Program

Does your home need energy efficiency retrofits?

According the US Dept. of Energy, “checking a home’s insulation is one of the fastest and most cost effective ways to use a whole-house approach to reduce energy waste and make the most of your energy dollars.”

The Collaboration of Towns is once again offering low to moderate in-come household’s renovation, rehabilitation in conjunction with weatherization. Homeowner must meet income criteria and be willing to provide documentation that income is BELOW the following:

Income Table Household

(Veterans and/or Retired Homeowners will be given preference)

- 1 person: income below \$36,000 \$0 cost \$36,000-\$64,000 10%
- 2 people: income under \$51,600 \$0 cost \$51,600-\$73,100 10%
- 3 people: income under \$58,080 \$0 cost \$58,080-\$82,300 10%
- 4 people: income under \$64,500 \$0 cost \$64,500-\$91,400 10%
- 5 people: income under \$75,450 \$0 cost \$75,450-\$98,700 10%
- 6 people: income under \$81,050 \$0 cost \$81,050-\$106,000 10%



For all moderate income homeowners participating in this program (households with income limits that fall within 60% to 85% of State median income), MEA requests that all moderate income homeowners contribute at least 10% of the total project cost.

The following make the home ineligible for this opportunity:

- Had an energy audit within the past 6 months; Aggressive dogs not being safely handled; Drug use;
 - Threats to auditor; Home is sealed too tight resulting in the inability of fumes to escape through natural ventilation;
 - Major roof issues; Major plumbing problems; Gas leak; Structurally inadequate; Rental property;
 - Plaster ceiling (which needs a hatch cut to blow insulation into the attic).

The Medicare Drug Plan: 6 Key Facts

1. Anyone on Medicare can get coverage regardless of income or health.
2. You are not obligated to enroll, but there may be consequences if you don't sign up when you are first eligible to do so.
3. To get Medicare drug coverage, you must select one approved private drug plan among many offering different choices. There is no single government plan.
4. Is your income limited? If you qualify for a part of the program known as "Extra Help," you'll pay very little for your medications.
5. Are your drug costs very high? You'll pay no more than 5 percent of the cost of each prescription after you've spent a certain amount of money out-of-pocket in any one year.
6. Do you have better drug coverage already? You probably won't need Medicare's Part D coverage. But it's wise to check.

Healthy Heights Update

Our Health Program Coordinator Charmaine Turner met with members of the Healthy Heights program in late November at the Town Hall Building to discuss potential partnership and outreach opportunities. Healthy Heights is an initiative that promotes health and wellness in the communities of District Heights, Capitol Heights and Forest Heights. The coalition is made up of local stakeholders and agency representatives formed from the ACHIEVE (Action Communities for Health, Innovation, and Environmental Change) grant received by the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission (M-NCPPC). The grant is funded by the federal government's Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Some of the Healthy Heights goals and objectives outlined:

Project Goal 1.0: By April 2014, increase the fresh fruits and vegetable venues from unknown to three (3).

Project Goal 2.0: By March 2014, increase opportunities for structured after-school programs from zero (0) to two (2).

Project Goal 3.0: By March 2014, increase the number of physicians who refer at-risk cardiovascular patients to the Prescription-Rec program, a program designed to decrease dependency on certain prescription medications, from zero (0) to four (4).

- Albert Finney, as a converted Ebenezer Scrooge

Perspective is such a powerful variant that the same set of facts can cause one person to celebrate while another cringes. In Charles Dickens' classic story, *A Christmas Carol*, the Ebenezer Scrooge character is both of these people. The miserable and miserly Scrooge starts the story detesting people, life and, especially, that odious of all days- Christmas. By the end of the story (which all takes place in less than twenty-four hours), this man is a gleeful, good cheer spreading, missionary of good will, tickled to find out he hasn't missed Christmas! What happened? Leverage and perspective. The Ghosts of Christmas Past, Present, and Future showed Scrooge what a miserable wreck his attitude had made of his life and just what horrific penalty he would pay in the future if he did not change. Understanding that he was the source of his own misery was the perspective Scrooge needed, and what would become of his life if he did not change provided the leverage necessary for his decision to change.

In the film adaptation starring Albert Finney, Scrooge goes from snarling that he hates people and people hate him, to saying that he loves people and life and that life likes him. Unless you have leverage the size of a supernatural occurrence as Scrooge did, it is unlikely change will occur in your life this fast. However, only a fool can think you can spew venom, ill will, and selfishness into the universe and expect sugar, spice, and everything nice in return. Many have gotten away with it for a short time, but habits are quickly formed and difficult to break, and when one heads down that path, he or she is begging for eventual karmic payback. The outstanding news is that feeding the universe with good will, good cheer, concern and kindness will – over time – return the fruitage of this spirit to you- provided it is done in a spirit of sincerity. Don't believe me? Try smiling at everyone you pass and hand out a sincere compliment to everyone you cross paths with and see what happens. Better yet, make a commitment to loving life, love it truly, and see if life does not end up loving you. If life can forgive and embrace a miserable wretch like Ebenezer Scrooge, life will certainly embrace you. **Jeff**
